GIRAFFE DAY; JUNE 21ST

Giraffes are the tallest mammals on earth with legs that are 6' long and necks that are also 6' long. They only live in Africa and, aside from man, have only two predators; crocodiles and lions. To get a drink of water, a giraffe must spread its legs wide apart and lower its neck, making it a very easy target for the predator. If attacked a giraffe has only its long legs and sharp hooves for weapons. Luckily, the giraffe gets most of its water from the leaves it eats. It needs to actually drink water only once every few days.

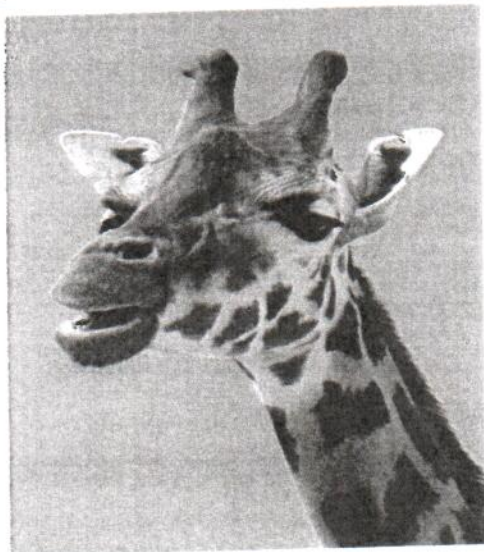
Giraffes sleep only 5 to 30 minutes a day, usually standing up. A giraffe will lie down only if a second giraffe is there to stand guard. Giraffes need a lot of food to keep going and will eat up to 75 pounds of leaves every day. It has a sticky tongue that can reach up to 21 inches long to help with the task.

Giraffes are social animals living in groups called "Towers". Just like human finger prints, no two giraffes will have the same spots. They have very long

out of their eyes. They also have a very long heart, up to 21 inches long!

The male giraffe is called a bull and the female is a cow. Both have horns. The female gives birth to only one calf. This baby begins life by dropping 5 feet to the ground at birth.

Giraffes live up to 25 years in the wild and 40 years in captivity. Their long necks are essential for their survival. It is how they are able to survey the surrounding plains for predators and reach their leafy food sources. The long necks are also used during battle with another giraffe in maneuvers called "necking". Unfortunately, poaching and the rapid growth of large cities has decreased the world's giraffe population by 30 %.

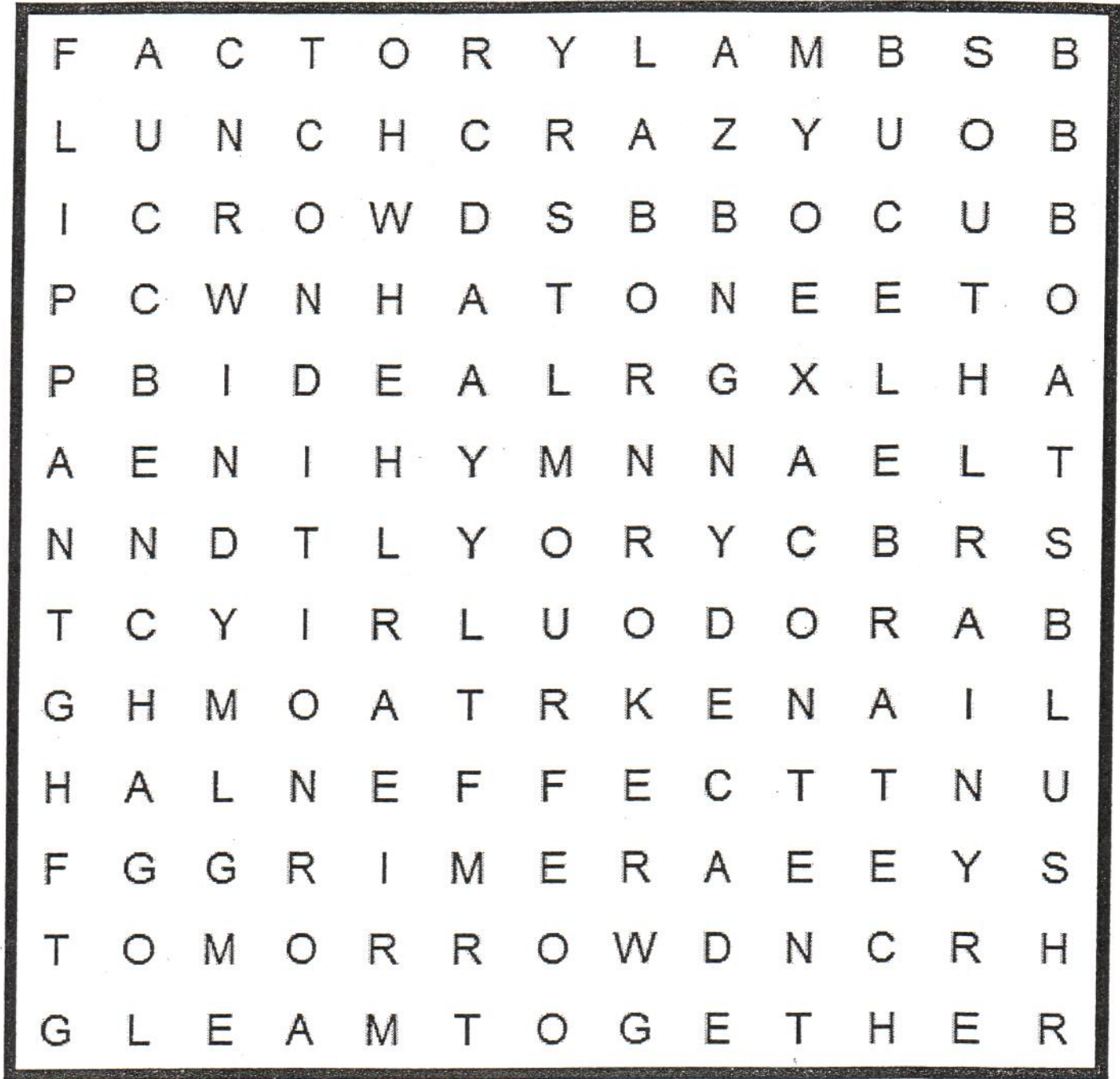

HORSERADISH DAYS – June 7-9

Horseradish is a perennial plant that grows to a height of 4 to 5 feet. It is related to mustard, cabbage, and broccoli. It is probably native to Europe and Asia but grows all over the world. Horseradish was once considered more valuable than gold and has been mentioned through history since the 1700s. Horseradish was initially used as a medicine with the Germans being the first to use it as a spice for fish.

Preparing horseradish can be hazardous to your health as the root is very pungent. To prepare the root one must wear heavy gloves and eye protection. A bandana across your mouth and nose is also good.

The root is peeled and then grated. The oils released upon grating will burn your eyes and skin so be careful ! It is absolutely best to do this work outside. Vinegar is added to stop the loss of oils so the sooner you add the vinegar after grating, the more mild the horseradish. If you want hot horseradish, wait 2-3 minutes before adding vinegar. Store in the refrigerator.

JUNE IS NATIONAL POLLINATOR MONTH

Butterflies are the most familiar insects to humans. There are about 17,500 species world-wide, 750 of those live in the United States. Butterflies have excellent vision, seeing a range of colors invisible to the human eye, and they have taste buds on their feet. Butterflies cannot fly in temperatures under 55 degrees. When temps are cooler, and at night, butterflies rest under leaves, hanging upside down. Butterflies do not sleep, they simply rest. As they have no eyelids, they cannot close their eyes.

Butterflies live on liquid diets that are sucked up through their long tongues; flower nectar, tree sap, and juices from ripe fruits. They do not need water for water's sake but they do require water for the minerals it contains. Butterflies drink from standing water, such as puddles. This is known as "puddling".

Several species of butterflies migrate with the seasons. The most famous of these is the Monarch that flies over 2,000 miles, one way, and then back again to lay eggs. Butterflies often live just a few weeks. Even this migrating butterfly lives only 6 to 9 months.

Butterfly wings are transparent. They are covered with scales and as the light reflects off these scales, it gives the appearance of color. These wings can flap 5 times per second and reach speeds of 12 mph. The largest butterfly is over 12 " wide, the smallest only 1/8 of an inch!

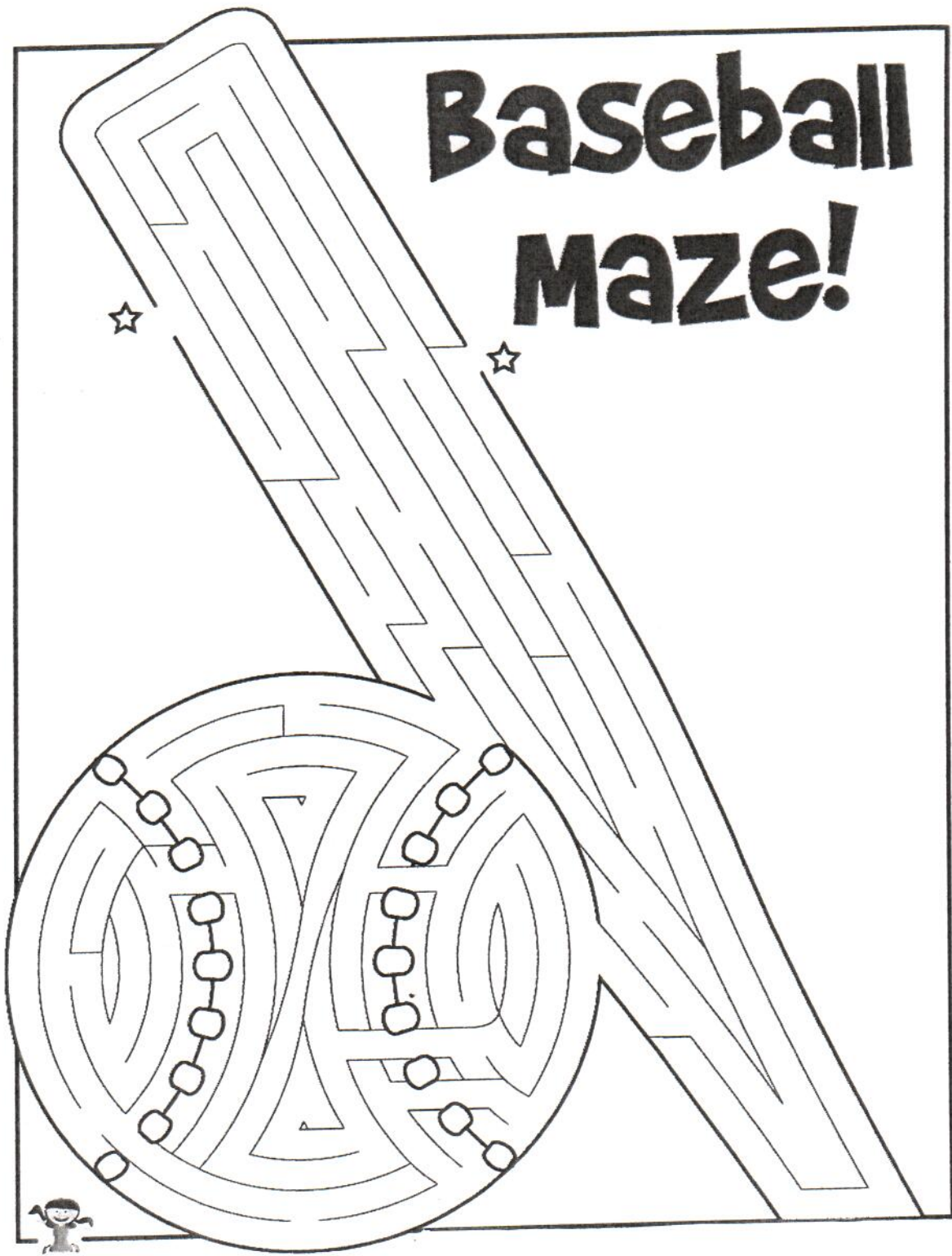

BLACK BEAR DAY; JUNE 5TH

Black bears are found in at least 40 of the 50 states. They have been seen in forested areas of N.D. but the state has no breeding pairs. Black bears are the smallest of the three species of bears in North America, standing about three feet tall at the shoulders and having a body about 7 feet long. Makes weigh 150 to 500 pounds.

Black bears have a life span of 18 to 25 years. They are superb climbers, scaling 100 feet in 30 sec., and they can sprint up to 35 mph. Black bears have an acute sense of smell, 7 times better than a blood hound, and good eyesight. They also see in color.

Black bears eat vegetation, fruit, bugs, birds, and small animals. In the spring and summer, the bears consume about 5,000 calories a day. In the fall, in preparation for hibernation, they consume up to 20,000 calories a day! Black bears are considered "super hibernators", falling into a deep sleep for 4 to 6 months without eating or drinking. The cubs, 1 to 5 of them, are born in the winter den, weighing only $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ pound.

Bears are among the first animals children learn to recognize, largely through Teddy bears, Smokey Bear, and fairy tales. (Unfortunately, in the fairy tales, the docile non-aggressive Black Bear is lumped right in with the much scarier Grizzly.) Black bears have only one dangerous predator and that is man.

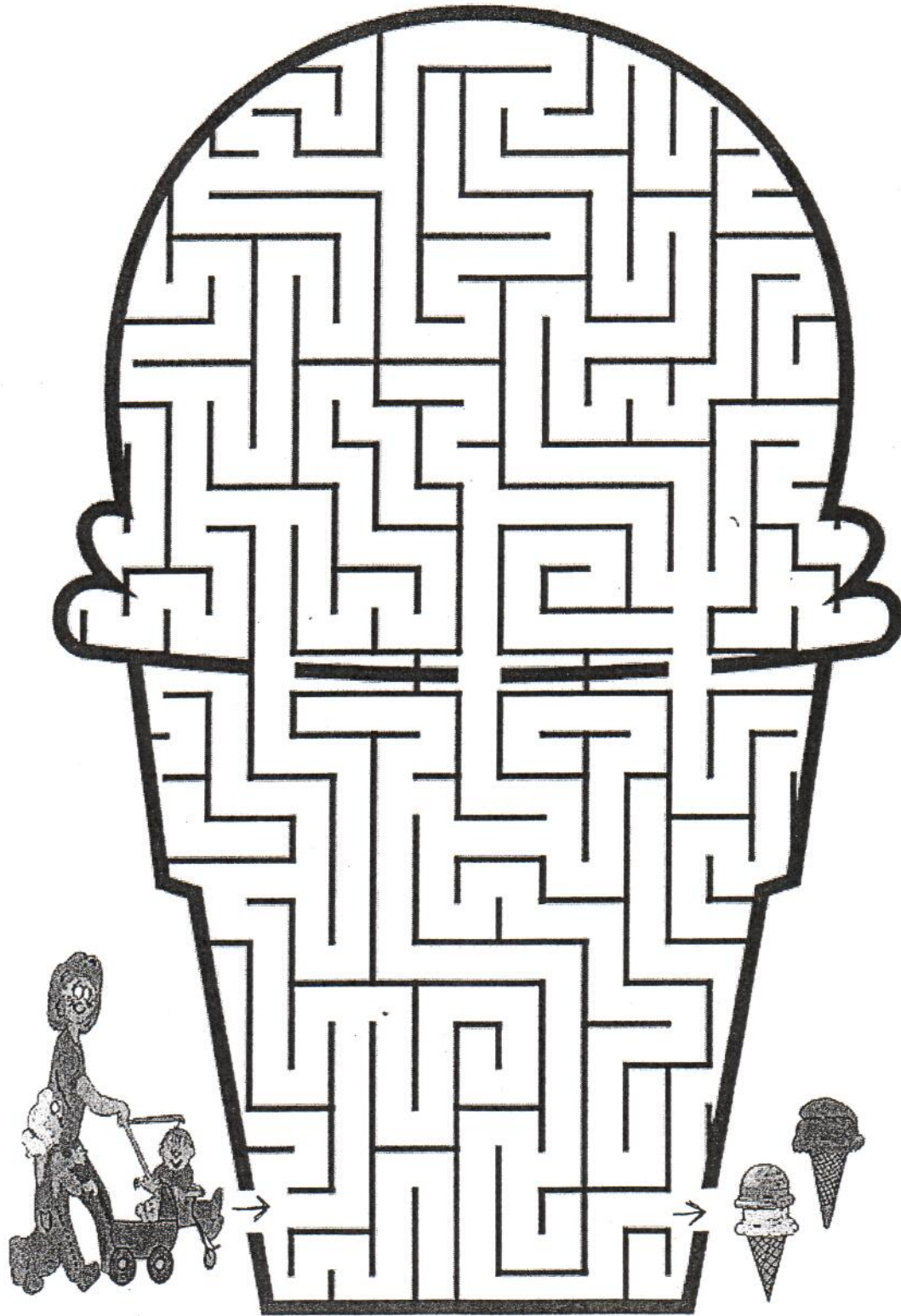

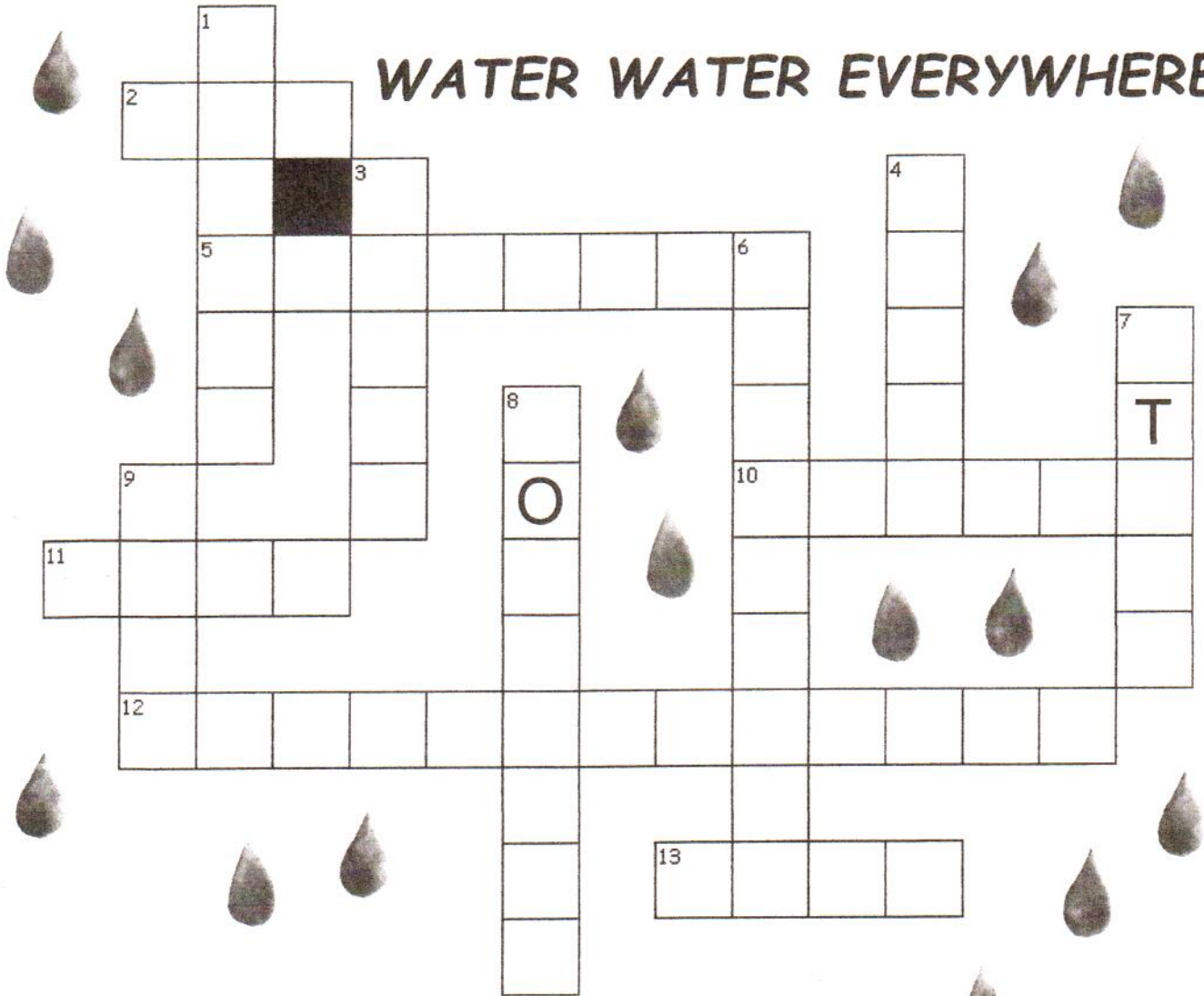
