CABLE CARS

January 17th is National Cable Car Day. To help us get the proper perspective, here is a short history.

Mr. Andrew Hallidie arrived in America from Great Britain in 1852. He settled in San Francisco where street cars were pulled by horses. In 1869, Mr. Hallidie witnessed a tragic accident. The steep grades were wet and slippery and the street car was heavily loaded with passengers. The horses struggled to get footing on the slick cobblestones. They were unsuccessful as the heavy car dragged them backward. Five horses were dragged to their deaths.

Mr. Hallidie and his father were inventors of “wire rope”, or cable. After coming to America, Andrew Hallidie found use for this cable in the gold country of California. After witnessing the accident and terrible deaths of the horses, he devised a plan for moving the cars with cable. The first cable car ran in 1873.

THE BLIZZARD OF 1966

Noon Wednesday, March 2, 1966, snowflakes began to fall over North Dakota. By Friday winds had reached a steady 70 mph with gusts to 100 mph, leaving drifts 20 to 30 feet high. Actual snowfall varied across the state from 20 to 30 inches. Jamestown recorded 27". The snow buried entire buildings, cars, trains, over passes, and power lines. A train with 500 passengers was trapped in deep snow near New Salem and was eventually dug out by hand as the snow was too deep for any equipment to handle.

Five people died in North Dakota and there was a tremendous loss of domestic animals. Numbers vary but over 44,000 head of cattle died, 8,900 sheep, 2,400 hogs, 7,000 turkeys plus others too numerous to count. Many cattle died because they were blinded by the snow and wandered into fencing. Others died in barns that collapsed from the snow's weight and still others died in barns so tightly sealed by the snow that they suffocated.

There were other blizzards more deadly to humans than the one of 1966 but due to its length and ferocity, the blizzard of 1966 is considered the worst in history.

What's the difference between a snow storm and a blizzard ? To be a blizzard, visibility must be $\frac{1}{4}$ mile or less and the winds must blow at least 35 mph. The event must last at least 3 hours. If any of these conditions are less than listed, it is not a blizzard, it is a snow storm.

The US averages 105 snow producing storms a year. Between 1960 and 1994, the US averaged 9 blizzards a year. Since 1995, the average has increased to 19 !

Snowflakes are clear. Light refraction make them appear white. The largest snowflake ever recorded was found in Montana. It was 15 " wide and 8" thick !!

On March 5, 2015, Capracotta, Italy received 100" of snow in 18 hours ! Mount Baker in Washington state has the world record snowfall of 1, 140 " in one season; 1998-99.

80% of all fresh water on earth is frozen, either as snow or as ice.

The Eskimos have over 100 words for snow.

All snow flakes have 6 sides.

Chionophobia is the fear of snow.

The Dutch shoot fireworks and eat "oil balls", our equivalent to doughnut holes, powdered with sugar.

One of the most rousing celebrations in the world is held in Scotland. They enjoy street entertainment, street festivals, concerts, and fire festivals.

The folks in Spain eat 12 grapes at midnight, one for each toll of the clock. The grapes represent good luck for each month of the new year.

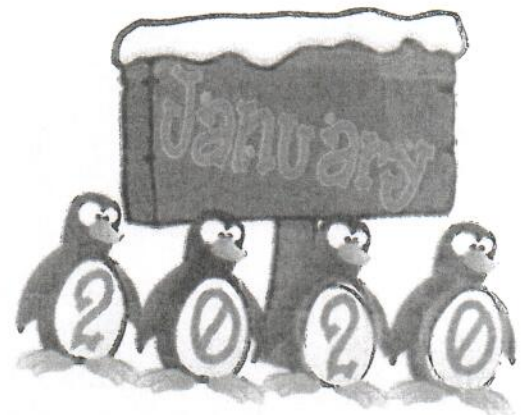

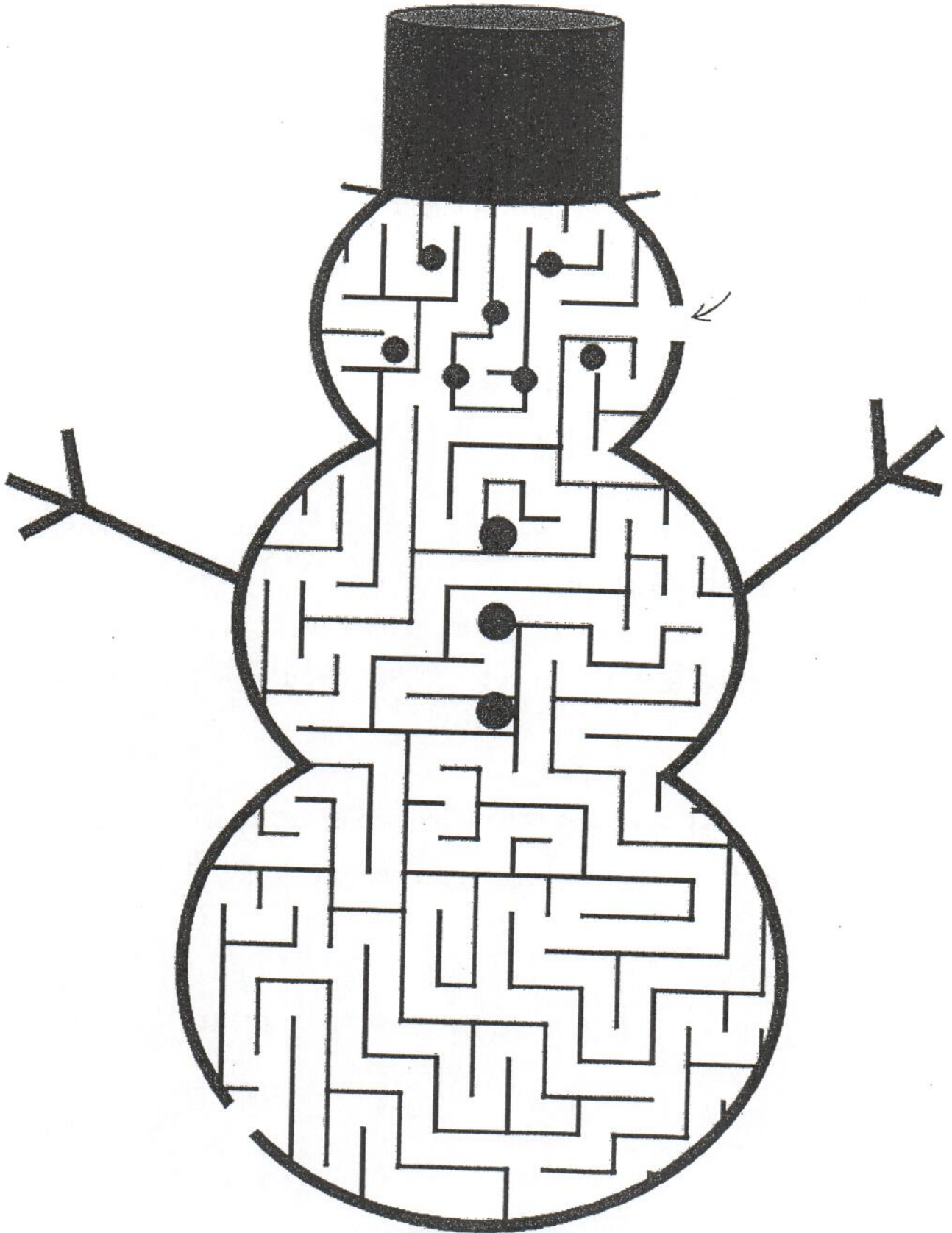

In 2018, the dry bean crops of pinto beans, kidney beans, navy beans, and black beans netted 866 million dollars in sales.

In 2018, 6,900 acres were planted to soy beans, yielding 239, 400,000 bushels of beans valued at \$2,021,209,000. 00.

In 2018, 185,000 acres were planted to lentils yielding 2,398,000 bushel valued at \$36,210,000.00.

Beans are an excellent source of protein, fiber, vitamins, and minerals. They are low in fat, sodium, and cholesterol.

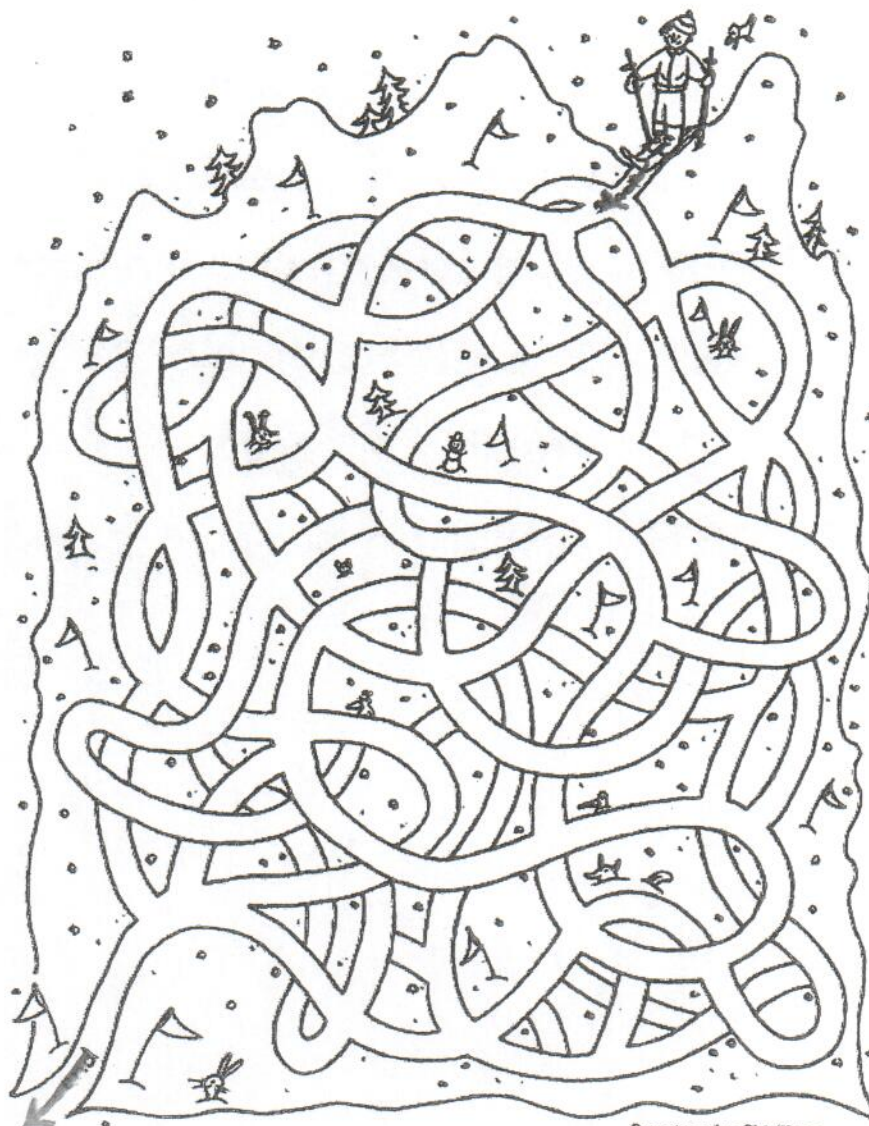

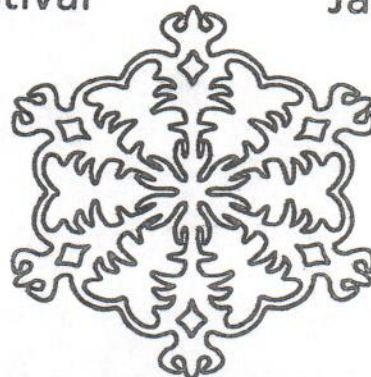

WHAT IS EPIPHANY ?

Christmas begins with Christmas day, December 25th and lasts for twelve days, until January 6th, known as Epiphany. It is also known as “Three Kings Day” because it is the day the kings arrived in Bethlehem to present their gifts to the baby Jesus.

Traditionally, the twelve days of Christmas begin the evening of December 25, making the evening of January 5th the Twelfth Night. Celebrations are often held this night with feasting and dancing.

The one or two Sundays between Christmas day and Epiphany are known as Christmastide. The colors of Epiphany are white and gold and the symbols associated with Epiphany are crowns, three gifts, and a five pointed star.

* What is MENUDO ? Why do we have a special monthly celebration for menudo? Menudo is a hot and spicy Mexican soup. It is made from tripe (the lining of a cow's stomach), hominy, garlic, onions, dried chilies, and lime juice. Because it is said to be a magical hangover remedy, it is served the night after a celebration, like a new year's party.

** Cuckoo Dancing ??? Cuckoo dancing week is a tribute to Laurel & Hardy. The Cuckoo song is the duo's signature tune so the days of Jan. 11 through the 17th are a time to enjoy silliness and shake off the winter blues.

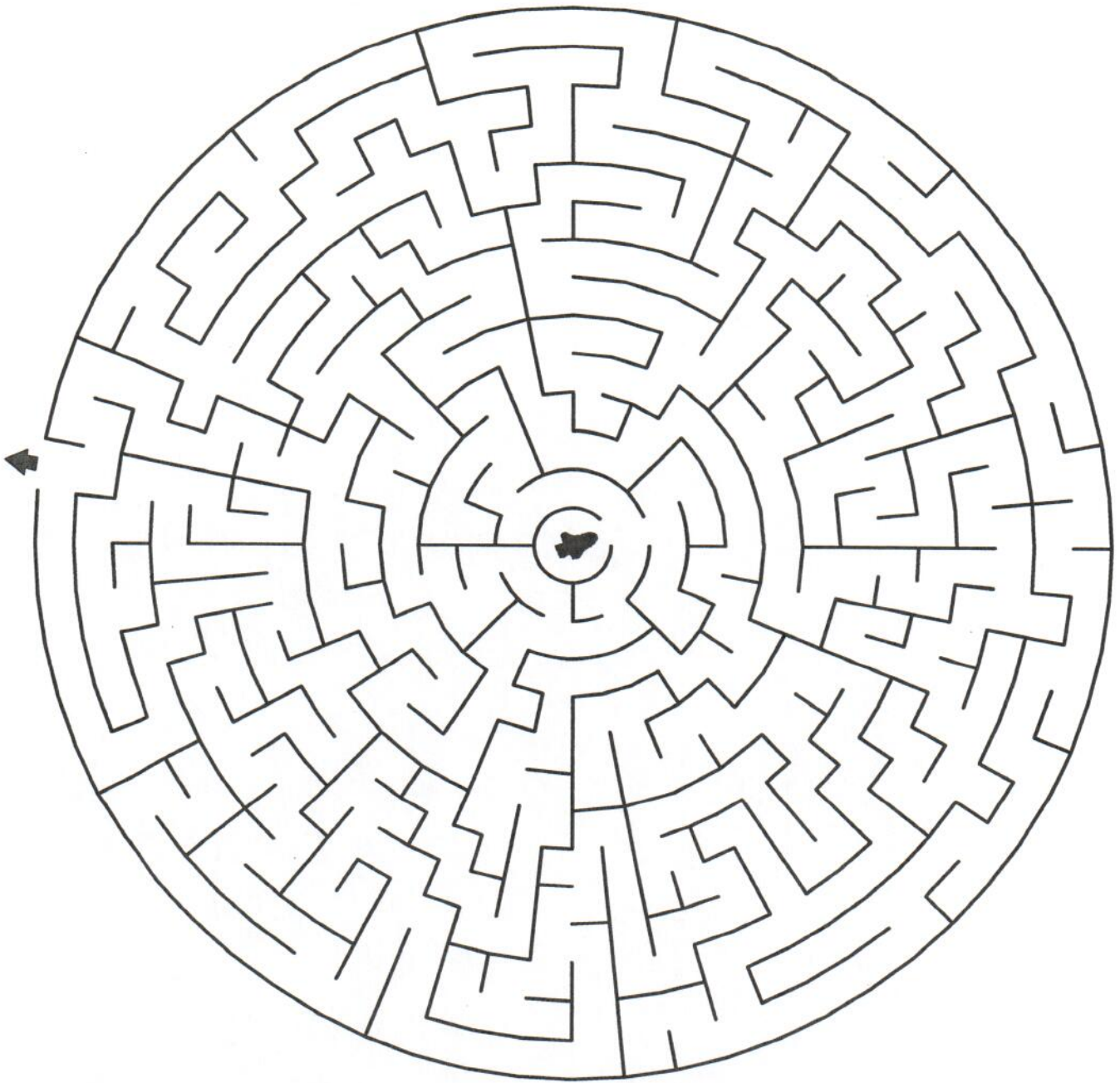

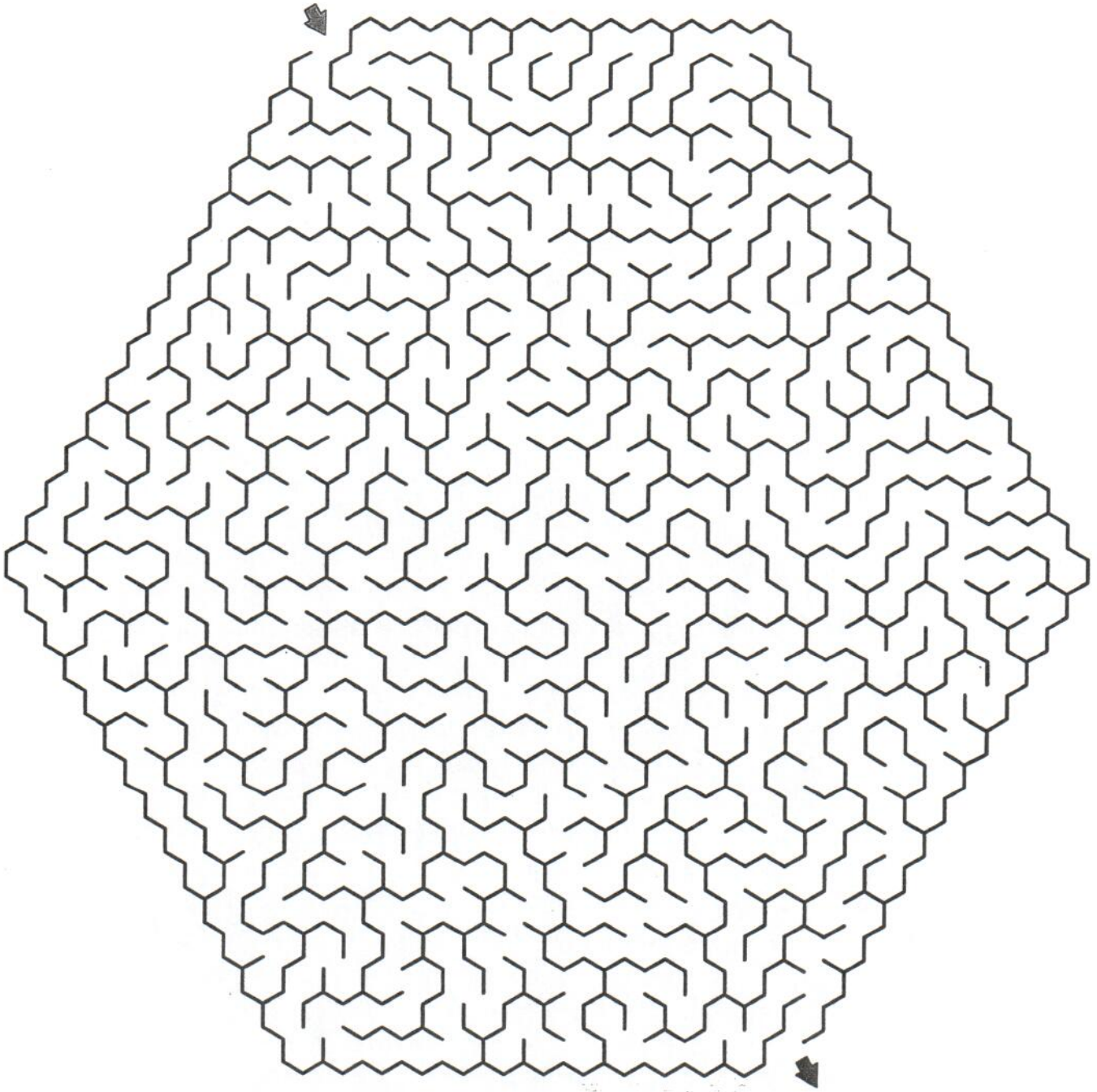

It is said that the original recipe is the most sought after recipe in the world. Employees at the New Orleans restaurant are pledged to secrecy and will not even talk about it!

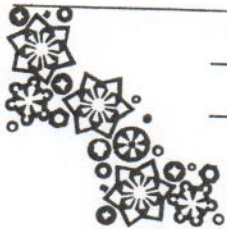

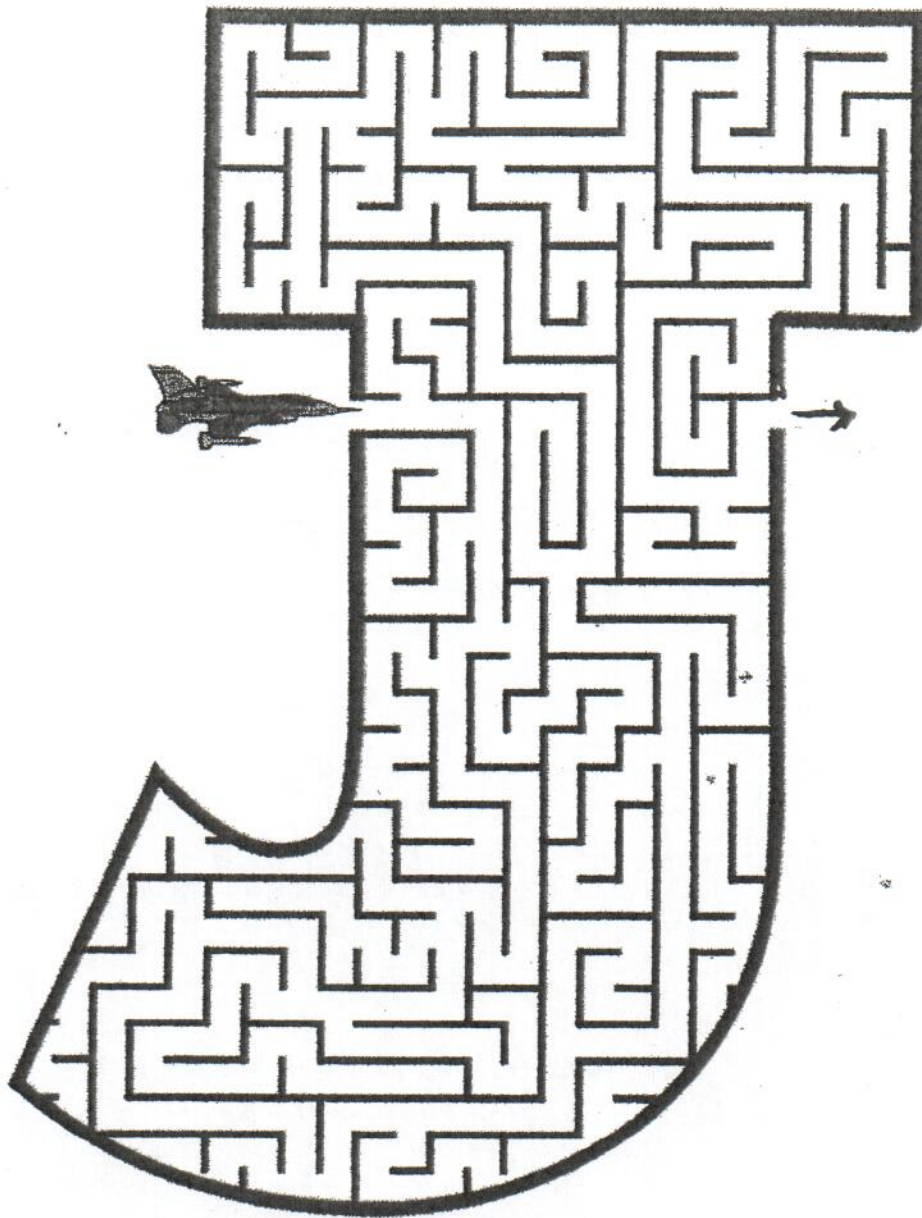

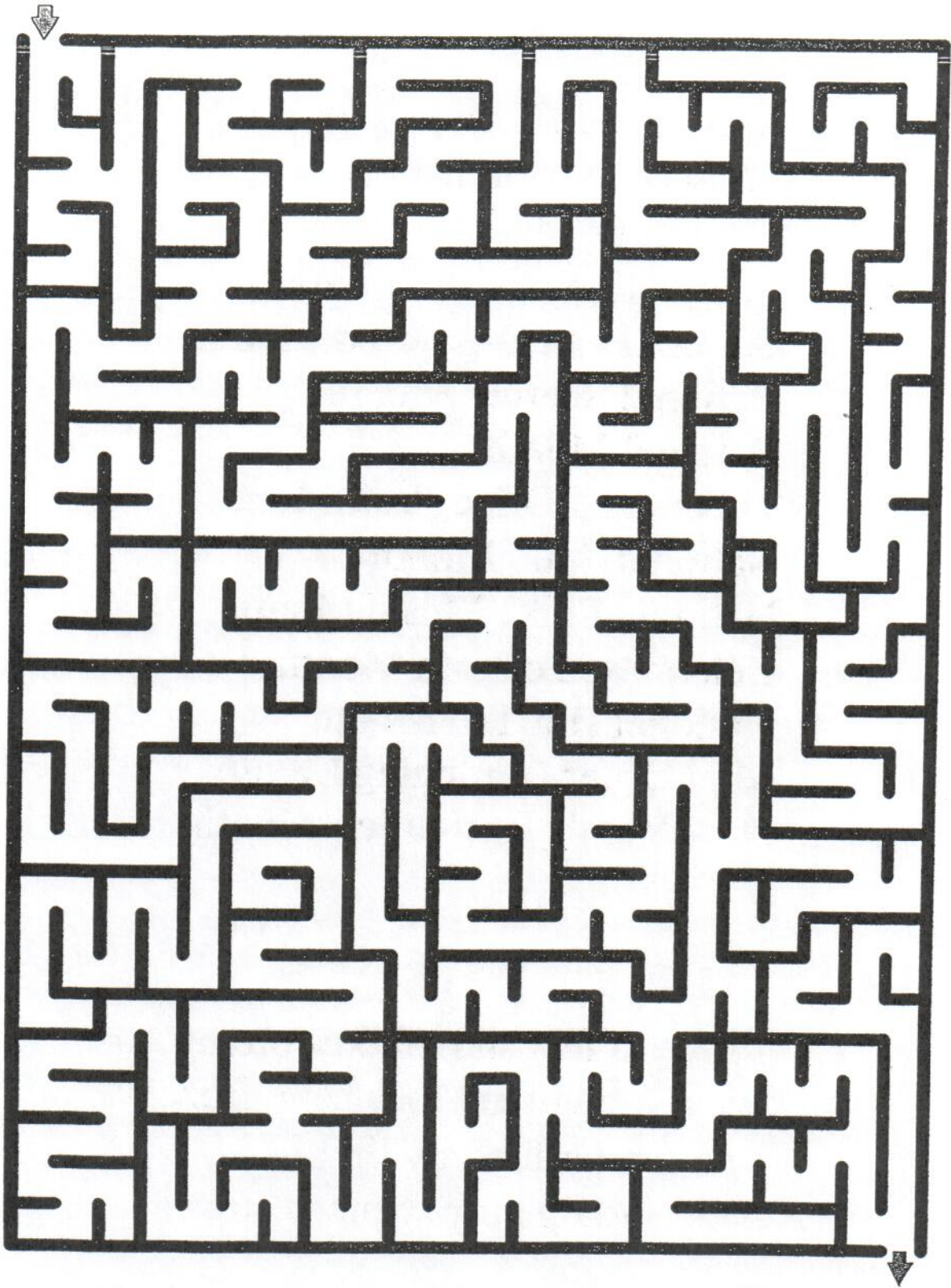
